



INTERCARGO's membership remained at historic high levels through to year 2024 (the publication's reporting period: September 2023 – November 2024), with close to 160 companies as Full Members, and over 100 Associate Members, i.e. a total of 260 companies from 30 different countries. With a registered fleet near the 3,300 ships mark and representing over one-third of the global dry bulk fleet by deadweight, our Association reaffirmed its position as the representative body of the dry bulk shipping sector.

Geopolitical conflicts in the Red Sea and its impact on global shipping

Since November 2023, Houthi forces in Yemen have continuously attacked international shipping in the Southern Red Sea, the Bab el Mandeb, and the Gulf of Aden. Such targeted attacks have turned key global shipping routes into danger zones, killing seafarers and threatening their well-being. This is totally unacceptable and must be rejected by all.

Consequently, many ship owners and operators decided to take alternative routes, disrupting global shipping and retail supply chains with increased transit time. As a result, the longer distances caused by rerouting from the Suez Canal to the Cape of Good Hope imply a holders to take decisive action to safe-70% increase in greenhouse gas emissions for a round trip from Singapore to Northern Europe.

The Houthis have broadened their threats beyond vessels they believe are linked to Israel, the United States, and the United Kingdom, to include the entire fleet of some companies whose ships may have previously called at Israeli ports one or targeting of merchant ships which directtwo years ago. The information used by the Houthi forces is of uncertain accuracy, and collateral damage from erroneous attacks has occurred.

Merchant vessels crewed by civilian seafarers transporting global trade have a right to innocent passage through the region without the threat of attack. 

Investigation of incidents

Dry bulk ships are at the very heart of global trade, transporting iron ore, steel, coal, cement and grains. As the statistics of the INTERCARGO Bulk Carrier Casualty Report 2024 demonstrates, there is a clear trend of improved safety and declining ship losses at a time of fleet growth. Improved safety is largely thanks to constant learning, better crew training, improved ship design, new technology and stronger regulatory compliance. However, very sadly, major incidents involving loss of life have occurred and we must pay close attention to the causes explained in this report-there is no room for complacency.



INTERCARGO is determined to help lead the response to these events. We are working with our members, including ship owners and industry stakeholders. to do all we can to learn and protect the lives of the brave men and women who crew bulk carriers. Enhancement of safety awareness for personnel both onboard and ashore is a priority to reduce and remove safety gaps. Reviewing the past decade, a significant contributing factor to the safety performance of bulk carriers is the development and implementation of new international rules and regulations and, as a Non-Governmental Organisation (NGO) within the International Maritime Organization (IMO), INTERCARGO has played its part in the development of this legislation. The application of new technology to improve ship design and building and the introduction of new materials has also played its part.

While these improvements are encouraging, any loss of life remains tragic. The shipping industry must maintain unwavering vigilance and continue to learn from every incident and the findings of this report.

It is the intention of INTERCARGO to continue to work tirelessly with all stakeholders in order to improve bulk carrier safety and ultimately to strive for zero losses of seafarers and zero losses of

Reduction of Greenhouse Gas (GHG) emissions

INTERCARGO fully supports the IMO's ambition to achieve net zero emission shipping by or around 2050. However, the challenges ahead are substantial, and time is running short to meet these targets. Decisive action from all stakeholders across the maritime dry cargo chain is needed to succeed in this alobal effort.

Shipping is inherently global, requiring a truly international regulator like the International Maritime Organization (IMO) to ensure a level playing field for this diverse industry and the nations it serves. Achieving net-zero emissions in shipping demands urgent progress in developing green technologies, propulsion systems, alternative fuels, infrastructure, and "Green Hubs." Mechanisms such as the industry's proposed levy-based economic measure are vital to facilitate this transition.


Meeting the IMO's 2030 and 2040 targets requires a realistic pathway to net-zero emissions, where the entire supply chain addresses these challenges holistically with shared responsibility. Stakeholders-including shipyards, engine builders, technology providers, charterers, ports, cargo shippers, banks, and insurers-must collaborate on this journey to a sustainable future. Governments must also play their part by developing the infrastructure necessary to ensure global availability of low- and zero-carbon fuels.

INTERCARGO has been a leading advocate for a levy-based market-based measure (MBM) per tonne of CO₂ emissions to accelerate the adoption of zero-carbon fuels. It supports a simple and effective basket of mid-term measures, such as the revised International Maritime Sustainability Fund and Reward mechanism, which integrates the IMO Maritime Sustainability Fund with a streamlined Global GHG Fuel Standard as a technical measure.

A global lifecycle emissions standard for all fuels is essential to provide stability for the industry. Our Association actively participates in IMO discussions and correspondence groups. INTERCARGO's Emissions Working Group, has been assessing, the technical aspects of short term and midterm measures along with the guidelines on lifecycle GHG intensity of marine fuels (LCA guidelines) and the Development of Technical Guidance for Safety of Ships using Alternative Fuels.

While supporting technical and operational measures to reduce GHG emissions, INTERCARGO emphasizes the need to prioritize safety. The association will continue engaging in the development of a robust regulatory framework for ships using new technologies and alternative fuels.

Ballast water

With the purpose of preventing the spread of invasive species, the International Maritime **Organization adopted The** International Convention for the Control and Management of Ships' Ballast Water and Sediments (Ballast Water Convention) which entered into force on 8th September 2017.

Vessels constructed on or after 8th September 2017 have been required to install a Ballast Water Treatment System to comply with the Conventions discharge requirements. For vessels constructed prior to this date, compliance with the Convention's D-2 depended on a vessel's IOPP survey cycle with the final deadline being 8th September 2024

The relatively recent entry into force of the Convention, involving new regulations and the fitting and operation of equipment that had previously not been used on ships has led, unsurprisingly, to a number of challenges.

The implementation challenges of the Convention especially relate to the performance of ballast water treatment systems, the operating conditions and locations of vessels, and the global coverage of technical support for the systems involved. It is important to note that while ships are certified for global trade, many of the available systems are not certified or able to perform in all locations and conditions that vessels may trade in, and this is particularly true for the bulk carrier fleet.

A holistic approach to regulations is also important. Shipping is trying to decarbonise which in the short term to mid-term will mean finding efficiencies and ultimately using less power. However, regulations such as the Ballast Water Management Convention effectively require vessels to use more power and thus produce more emissions, leading to a situation where one environmental regulation potentially has a negative effect on another environmental regulation. Regulators should recognise the consequences of all regulations and how they may impact each other.

Piracy and armed robbery at sea

Be aware of the sea areas and ports affected by piracy and to relevant Navy's reporting centers if practical.

According to information made available in IMO's GI-SIS module, 150 incidents of piracy and armed robbery against ships were reported as having occurred or been attempted in 2023. This therefore constitutes an increase of approximately 15% at the global level compared to the same period in 2022. The areas most affected by acts of piracy and armed robbery against ships in 2023 were the Straits of Malacca and Singapore (85), West Africa (22), South China Sea (14) and South America (Pacific) (14), followed by Indian Ocean (5), South America (Caribbean) (4), Arabian Sea (2), East Africa (2), South America (Atlantic) (1) and Mediterranean Sea (1).

There has been an improvement in the overall situation of Piracy and Armed Robbery Against Ships in Asia during January-June 2024, with a 16% decrease in the number of incidents compared to January-June 2023. A total of 51 incidents of Piracy and armed robbery at sea was reported during January-June 2024 compared to 61 incidents during the same period in 2023.

Kidnappings for ransom occurred in the Gulf of Guinea (GoG) in 2024. In January 2024, nine crew members were kidnapped from a Tuvalu-flagged tanker 46 nautical miles southwest of Bioko Island, Equatorial Guinea. On May 29, 2024, two crew members were kidnapped from a general cargo ship 25 nautical miles south of Bioko Island, Equatorial Guinea, Ships transiting this area should visit the Maritime Domain Awareness for Trade-Gulf of Guinea (MDAT-GoG) website at https://gog-mdat.org/home for additional information on threats and specific recommendations for vessels.

Somali piracy still poses a threat, with eight reported incidents in the first half of 2024, including three hijackings. Recent incidents demonstrate the continued capability and capacity of the Somali pirates to target vessels up to 1,000 nautical miles (nm) off the Somali coast.

Operation Atalanta, formally known as the European Union Naval Force (EU NAVFOR) Somalia, issued a Threat Assessment in September 2024, classifying the piracy threat to ships transiting the Red Sea (RS), Bab al Mandeb Strait (BAM), Gulf of Aden (GOA) and the Western Indian Ocean (WIO) as MODERATE (an attack is a REALISTIC POSSIBILITY) in GoA. Potential for Pirate Action Groups (PAGs) to target vessels in IRTC without the need for a mother vessel. However, across the Arabian Sea (AS), it is assessed as LOW (an attack is UNLIKELY) due to the weather conditions during the SW monsoon period, impacting most of this area.

The shipping industry will continue to monitor and advise on maritime security threats to assist the safe transit of vessels and the seafarers who crew them. Pre-voyage threat and risk assessments should still be carried out considering the latest maritime security information from organisations supporting the Voluntary Reporting Area (VRA). The industry Best Management Practices will continue to provide the necessary guidance for shipping to ensure that threat and risk assessments are developed for every voyage to mitigate the risks presented by remaining security threats in the relevant region.

The shipping industry maintains a Maritime Global Security Website, which provides guidance and external links. The site can be navigated using the drop-down menus to specify the type of risk/issue, or geography. International shipping industry associations, including INTERCARGO, have joined forces to continue updating the resource.

Digitalisation **& Cyber Risks**

The maritime industry is undergoing rapid digital transformation, driven by the twin goals of operational efficiency and decarbonisation. Bulk carrier shipowners are increasingly digitalising their operations while ensuring robust cybersecurity across the entire supply chain.



The shipping industry is advancing stead-vant frameworks to achieve operational ily in its digital transformation, pursuing the aspiration of decarbonisation, and vice include: preparing for new development, such · IMO circular MSC-FAL.1/Circ.3/ as, autonomous navigation. This transformation extends beyond shipowners, with the shipbuilding industry developing new digital ecosystems to enhance construction processes and stakeholder participation. Equipment manufacturers are benchmarking themselves against the most advanced efficiency and safety improvement initiatives towards informatisation, digitalisation, intelligence and autonomy. Class Societies are developing new Unified Requirements on cyber systems to raise the defence against cyber risks. Port and terminal sectors will implement "Maritime Single Window" from 2024.

Shipowners are implementing digital monitoring technologies and supporting software solutions to ensure network security, while charterers have added cyber risk management to their checklists.

- board systems and equipment for product suppliers to demonstrate compliance with cyber security requirements, to be mandatory for classed ships for construction on or after 1 January 2024.

Human **Element**

INTERCARGO continues to participate in the HEIG, which was established in conjunction with the IMO to facilitate industry input into various IMO initiatives. Our primary focus has been predominantly on issues involving hazards associated with Enclosed Space Entry, with specific em- tive aims to build on the IMO's strategic phasis on "time pressure" and its impact on the effective implementation of enclosed space entry procedures.

Through the efforts of the HEIG the IMO established a correspondence group tasked with recommending changes to Resolution A 1050 (27) concerning recommendations for entering enclosed spaces. As a result of the correspondence group work the IMO CCC 10 completed a revision of Resolution A.1050(27) "Revised **Recommendations for Entering Enclosed** Spaces Aboard Ships", which will be forwarded to MSC 110 in 2025 for approval.


Membership evolution

Number of Member companies


